#### **ASBRT Call to Action**

In the realm of respiratory care regulation, the Alabama State Board of Respiratory Therapy (ASBRT) has faced a critical challenge in 2023 and is now rallying the ASRC for support against a proposed bill that could reshape licensure boards in the state.

In 2023, the ASBRT reached out to the ASRC, seeking assistance in reaching state representatives to thwart a proposed bill aiming to consolidate all licensure boards under the Secretary of State. While the bill did not pass, a looming threat persists as the representative behind the proposal plans to reintroduce a revised version in the upcoming legislative session.

The proposed bill comes with telling exclusions—two state boards that the representative serves on and larger groups with the financial means to employ lobbyists for instance the Nursing Association, and Security Exchange. Unfortunately, the ASBRT remains on the inclusion list. The rationale behind this move is the purported cost-saving measure, claiming it will benefit the

state financially. However, it's crucial to note that the ASBRT operates independently without any state funding. The entire operational funding is directly sourced from licensee fees.

In recent years, the ASBRT proactively joined forces with the Dietetics board, pooling resources and cutting operational costs. This strategic collaboration has prevented additional increases in licensure fees. Despite increasing costs related to state programs, the ASBRT has managed to streamline the application process significantly. Applicants who complete the process correctly and submit all required information can now secure licensure within 1-2 business days, a stark improvement from the previous 10-30-day timeline, or timelines from other states which can take months.

If consolidation under the Secretary of State becomes a reality, the ASBRT anticipates a reversal in the efficiency gains achieved. The licensure process's speed could diminish, and increased



personnel costs mould lead to higher fees for licensees.

The ASBRT urges every member of the respiratory care community to proactively engage with their congress members. This is a battle to safeguard our profession's future in Alabama. When the bill resurfaces in the next legislative session, it is crucial to voice opposition. Protecting the autonomy of licensure boards is vital to maintaining the efficiency, financial independence, and streamlined processes that directly benefit both the board and its licensees.

Let your voice be heard—contact your congress members and join the ASBRT in its unwavering commitment to protect respiratory care in the state.

# The latest on Compact Licensure

Compact Licensure is a visionary concept that aims to simplify the licensure process for respiratory care professionals, allowing them greater flexibility and ease of practice across different states. As the initiative moves into its next phase in 2024, it marks a significant step towards realizing this vision.

In a demonstration of the importance of this initiative, the AARC has received a grant from the Department of Defense (DOD) to further explore the opportunities presented by an interstate compact. The grant will be administered through the National Center for Interstate Compacts, which is part of the Council of State Governments (CSG). This grant will allow for the development of model legislation, provide legislative resources, and allow state policymakers to join together in this endeavor.

ASRC Representatives Robert Johnson and Ed Goodwin have been working



with the AARC Compact Licensure Task Force, advancing discussions and formulating strategies to make respiratory care licensure more streamlined and accessible across state lines, including Alabama.

The AARC has extended its commitment to engage members and state af-

filiates during each phase to ensure every therapist can stay informed about the developments in Compact Licensure. This transformative initiative has the potential to reshape the landscape of licensure requirements, opening up new opportunities for practitioners across the nation.

#### **AARC** Activates Disaster Relief

Since its inception in 1992, the AARC Disaster Relief Fund has been a beacon of support for members facing the aftermath of federally declared natural disasters. Established with the primary aim of assisting those who suffer damage to their homes or personal property, the fund continues to make a meaningful impact in times of crisis.

AARC members living in officially declared disaster areas are eligible to apply for a grant of up to \$1,000. The application process is made convenient, allowing members to apply either online or by mail using the AARC downloadable application form, accessible at <a href="https://www.aarc.org/aarc-membership/aarc-membership/aarc-membership-benefits/aarc-disaster-relief-fund/">https://www.aarc.org/aarc-membership/aarc-disaster-relief-fund/</a>.
