Upcoming Tuesday Talks:

July 11th: AARC Guidelines On Artificial Airway Suctioning

Hosted by Nicholas Prevo BSRT, RRT-ACCS, NPS, CPFT, AE-C

⇒ AARC clinical practice suctioning guidelines has been updated from its original 2010 publication. These updates are based on evidence-based practices from peer reviewed literature and are often viewed as the gold standard in the respiratory profession. After completion, learners will be able to discuss how the guidelines were created, understand best practices when suctioning artificial airways, and identify how new evidence factored into these recommendations.

August 8th: Biofilm in Endotracheal Tubes

Hosted by Simon Gutierrez MS, RRT, Clinical Specialist Respiratory Health, AVANOS

⇒ The course is designed to introduce or refresh clinician knowledge of the bacterial biofilm that develops and grows inside endotracheal tubes. The course explains what biofilm is and how biofilm develops. It also discusses where biofilm grows and how it becomes resistant to antibiotics. Lastly, it reviews several procedures and devices that help reduce and/or treat biofilm growth in endotracheal tubes.

September 12th: Understanding Blind Bronchoalveolar Lavage (mini-BAL) Hosted by Nicholas Prevo BSRT, RRT-ACCS, NPS, CPFT, AE-C

⇒ This course discusses the various methods used in the diagnosis of VAP, identifying the advantages and disadvantages of each approach. In addition, the recently introduced Blind Bronchoalveolar Lavage (mini-BAL) method is described in detail.

Have you Registered With CE Broker yet?

It's that time again! You must complete CE Broker registration and upload your CEUs to be eligible for license renewal this year. Renewal will start soon, so make sure you're ready!

The ASRC hosted a free webinar on how to use CE Broker, if you missed it, there are other resources to help you navigate CE Broker. The <u>ASBRT has a section</u> <u>dedicated to CE Broker</u>. Also, CE Broker

has a Support line Monday-Friday 8AM-8PM ET at 877-434-6323.

Don't forget, RTs are required to complete 24 contact hours of CEs during the 2 year licensure period with no more than 12 of those being non-traditional or self-study.

ASRC Board Member Highlight: Jerry King RRT



Jerry King is our House of Delegates Representative for Alabama.

What started your path to Respiratory Therapy?

When I was in high school, I dislocated my shoulder playing football. I had a really good athletic trainer and physical therapist help me. My goal was to become a physical therapist. Enter freshman year of college, the PT profession moved to a Master's degree. Someone said-try the Respiratory program for your BS degree. My first thought was-"what is that."

Fast forward a few years, I had some great experiences in my clinical rotations and saw the difference RTs were making, fell in love with the profession and never looked back.

What is your favorite thing about your career?

The favorite thing about my career is seeing the success and accomplishments of my students.

What is your favorite part of being on the ASRC board?

RT in Alabama is advancing! As an elected group of volunteers, it is not always easy to know what the board is doing for you. We adopted the AARC Strategic Plan of working to help Elevate, Advocate, Educate, and Engage, our profession. As your Alabama Society Board, we have been working on these goals to help represent Alabama RTs to the best of our ability. Here are some bullet points of what we are working on:

Elevate - Alabama is opening several new RT programs. We are excited to see more opportunities coming for students to join our field. Here are some programs coming soon:

- University of North Alabama Jabril Cooper Diamond and Erin Cantrell will be accepting students to their new bachelor's level program in fall semester.
- Coastal Community College Byron Truelove is actively looking for a candidate to fill the Director of Clinical Education position for their new program with a goal of admitting students in 2024.
- University of West Alabama Jerry King is working on getting that program started with an estimated start date in fall 2024. He will also be hiring a new DCE soon.
- Calhoun Community College currently completing interviews for a Program Director to start a program there.
- There are a couple of others that are also working on new programs, but I will wait to mention names until we have more official information.
- I am not trying to state the ASRC board is in any way responsible for opening these programs, but we have written letters of support and helped connect key stakeholders with Alabama RT leaders to support these efforts.

Advocate - the ASRC Board of Directors recently voted to approve travel reimbursement for our PAC (Political Action Committee) Reps to attend the national meeting in Washington, D.C., later this year. There, they will work to represent Alabama RTs at the national and at the state levels.

Educate - in addition to supporting the effort to open new programs, the ASRC held one of our largest conferences in several years in April. We hosted a very successful mini conference in Montgomery last month. We have mini conferences planned for Birmingham and Huntsville for August and September, with registration available on our website.

We are working on additional talks for Respiratory Care Week, and we will continue providing these through the end of the year!

Engage - one of the hardest goals to specify for our year is engagement. How can we better engage RTs across the state of Alabama? Here are some things we have been working on. Please share ideas if you have ways to improve our progress!

- HOSA we attended the Alabama HOSA Leadership conference earlier this year. Thanks to the team that represented us at the conference, we have been able to go into several high schools to share the idea of RT as a career choice.
- Leaders and Educators Roundtable Robert Johnson, UAB, and Ed Goodwin, JSU, have begun leading a monthly Zoom meeting to connect state leaders and educators. We had our first call June 22nd, with approximately 30 people participating. The group voted to do these on a monthly basis. This is not for CEUs, it is simply to help connect state RT leaders and RT educators. The call is open to RT leaders/educators in all capacities directors, managers, supervisors, lead therapists, dept. educators, RT program educators, etc. It is free. The meetings are tentatively scheduled for the 3rd Thursday of each month at 1pm. We will share the link through AARConnect, email, etc.
- Alabama RT Educators the Alabama RT Educators have formed a group to connect with each other. We will begin meeting once per quarter, starting in July. The Alabama RT Education landscape is changing drastically, this committee meeting is meant to share ideas, best practices, accreditation pointers, and simply connect with colleagues.

As you can see, we have been busy. We are working hard to represent you. We are always looking for ways to improve, so please do not hesitate to reach out and let us know if you have any ideas. If you want to be a part of this team, we need volunteers! Just let us know and we will get you busy somewhere!
