

#### It's time to renew!

It's that time again! You must complete CE Broker registration and upload your CEUs to be eligible for license renewal this year. License renewal must be completed by October 31st to prevent a lapse in licensure.

Don't forget, RTs are required to complete 24 contact hours of CEs during the 2 year licensure period with no more than 12 of those being non-traditional or self-study.

#### Pulmonary Fibrosis Awareness

September is Pulmonary Fibrosis Awareness Month. Pulmonary Fibrosis encompasses approx. 200 distinct conditions which are collectively called interstitial lung disease. Many of which have no known direct cause.

Idiopathic Pulmonary Fibrosis affects nearly 128,000 people in the US with approx. 48,000 new cases diagnosed each year. This results in about 40,000 deaths, which is comparable to breast cancer.

There is no current cure, but interventions are available to improve quality of life.
