Scroll down to "Reserve a Pre-commitment Plate" and click the link.

Certify you're not a robot, then click "Next."

In the Plate Type dropdown menu, select: Alabama Society for Respiratory Care

Complete the short application. You'll need your name, address, and vehicle information

(make, model, year, and VIN). Plates can be personalized at no extra cost.

If just a few people from each hospital, clinic, or classroom pre-commit, we'll reach 250 in no time. Once we hit that number, the plate goes into production and will be available statewide.


